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

The event started as we closed the first nine weeks by celebrating excellent





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10 tips on practicing good hunting safety

With many hunting seasons opening this month, I want to stress hunting safety. The 10 commandments of firearms safety

- 1. Always watch the muzzle! Keep it pointed in a safe direction at all times.
- 2. Treat every firearm with the respect due a loaded gun. It may be loaded, even if you think it is not.
- 3. Be sure of your target and what is in front of it and beyond it. Know the identifying features of the game you hunt. Make sure you have an adequate backstop, don't shoot at a flat, hard surface or water.
- 4. The best way to prevent an accidental discharge is to keep your finger outside of the trigger guard, until you are ready to shoot.
- 5. Make sure the barrel and action are free of obstructions, and carry only the proper ammunition for your firearm.
- 6. **Unload firearms when not in use.** Leave actions open, and carry firearms in cases and unloaded to and from the shooting area.

- 7. Only point a firearm at something you intend to shoot. Avoid horseplay with a gun.
- 8. **Don't run, jump, or climb with a loaded firearm.** Unload a firearm before you climb a fence or tree, or jump a ditch. Pull a firearm toward you by the butt, not the muzzle.
- 9. Store firearms and ammunition separately and safety. Store each in a secured location beyond the reach of children and careless adults.
- 10. Avoid alcoholic beverages before and during shooting activities. Also avoid mind- or behavior-altering medicines or drugs.

Also, more and more hunters are using tree stands, so I want to stress tree stand safety. Most deer hunters in Mississippi know someone who has been involved in a fall from a tree stand. There are hunters who are now confined to a wheelchair and many others who have lost their lives due to tree stand falls. While the number of firearm-related accidents has dropped dramatically in the past two decades, the number of tree stand accidents has risen sharply.

Seventy percent of tree stand falls occur when hunters are climbing up and into the stand or getting down from the stand. Almost the same percentage of hunters don't wear a fall restraint system during this critical time. Failure to wear a fall restraint system is the most important factor in tree stand falls.

I sometimes wonder why hunters climb 20 feet off the ground without any fall restraint system. Some people are willing to take more risks than others. Just maybe it's the same thing that draws hunters to wild places.

Another problem is financial in nature. Many hunters just don't want to spend a lot of money on a fall restraint system. Some hunters will pay thousands of dollars each year to participate in the sport they love. They spend money on hunting gear, leases or licenses, but, when it comes to climbing safety, that willingness disappears.

Tree stands are a popular and effective method of hunting. However, they also pose a significant safety risk. If you choose to hunt from a tree stand, you alone must be responsible for your own safety. Knowing and practicing safe tree stand procedures can minimize these risks and ensure your time afield will be both safe and enjoyable.

Dog and owner reunited at Crooked Creek after five years apart

If you think miracles don't happen, then you need to keep reading. This is a story that is over five years in the making. It's a story about Derek and Darby Carroll, Rhonda Martin, and Crooked Creek Animal Hospital. Together, they all made a miracle happen.

Six years ago, Derek was living in Oxford, Mississippi, and decided he wanted a dog. He went to the local animal rescue and adopted a sweet Schnauzer puppy, naming her Darby. From that very day, the two become inseparable and were known to family and friends as Derek and Darby. One year later, Derek and his wife moved to Jackson with Darby and their three other dogs. Darby went everywhere with Derek, especially when playing golf. Darby would sit on the golf cart and cheer him on. Then in May, 2016, Derek let Darby and his three other dogs out to his fenced back yard. Fifteen minutes later, he let his dogs back inside his house with Darby not among them. For over a year, Derek searched for Darby, driving around the neighborhood, putting up posters, making social media posts, everything he could think to do to find Darby, with no success. Darby was gone, and Derek was left with a broken heart.

Fast forward to September 2021: Rhonda Martin was driving by a gas station on Highway 43 in Pelahatchie

and noticed a stray dog walking on the side of the road. She pulled over and was able to get the dog to come to her. She could tell the dog was not homeless but was lost and missing from her home. She took the dog home, gave her food and water and comfort care. Rhonda made a social media post about the sweet dog she had found, hoping maybe someone would recognize her and claim her. But no one did.



The next day, Rhonda called Crooked Creek Animal Hospital, explaining she had found the dog and was wondering what she could do to possibly find the owner. Rhonda was asked if she could bring the dog to the clinic so she could be checked for a microchip. The dog did have a microchip with the information about the owner. Thinking the dog had only been missing for a day or two and a phone call was being made to the recent owner of the missing dog, a phone call was actually made to Derek Carroll. Derek was asked if he is missing a Schnauzer dog. Dumbfounded,

Derek was given directions to Crooked Creek Animal Hospital and was on his way to an uncertainty if Darby would remember him. A happy nervousness was sensed as Darby was placed in Derek's arms. Derek, being overwhelmed with joy, had to take a seat and just soak the blessed moment in. It didn't take long before Darby began to recognize she was being reunited with her very first friend. Derek was so grateful to Rhonda and Crooked Creek Animal Hospital and could not wait to get Darby home so he could spend time getting reacquainted with Darby. That afternoon was filled with lots of licks, hugs, and tears of joy. Derek and Darby were once again, Derek and Darby.

This is not just a story of a lost dog being reunited with her owner because the owner was caring enough to microchip his dog. This is miracle story which could have had a tragic ending or no ending at all. Darby could have never gone missing from where she was living. But Darby was found, and her ending is just the beginning of a long and happy life, with her Derek.



School attendance = student success

Attendance is an important factor in student achievement. A missed school day is a

lost opportunity for students to learn. The effects of lost school days build up one absence at a time.

One of the most important things your child can do to reach the goal of success is also one of the most basic: attend school every day, on time. Students are required to be present for at least 63% of the school day, so coming late or leaving early also results in missed instructional time. By attending class regularly, children are more likely to keep up with daily lessons and assignments and take assessments on time. Research has shown that regular attendance may be the greatest factor influencing students' academic success.

The facts below were reported by Attendance Works, a leading national organization providing tools and resources for schools to reduce chronic absenteeism.

1. Absenteeism in the first month of

school can predict poor attendance throughout the school year. Half the students who miss 2-4 days in September go on to miss nearly a month of school.

- 2. Poor attendance can influence whether children read proficiently by the end of third grade or be held
- 3. By sixth grade, chronic absence becomes a leading indicator that a student will drop out of high school.
- 4. Research shows that missing 10 percent of the school (about 18 days) negatively affects a student's academic performance. That's just two days a month and that's known as chronic absence.
- 5. When students improve their attendance rates, they improve their academic prospects and chances for graduating.

The average daily attendance rate for August at Pelahatchie Elementary is the highest it's been since the 2017-2018 school year. This is a direct result of families valuing the importance of being at school each day on time. We appreciate the support and ask that you continue to make school attendance a priority to ensure success for all students. Attendance matters at Pelahatchie Elementary! Go Chiefs!


Ralph Lynn Ludke

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Pastor's Perspective: Every day is Thanksgiving Day

Well, here we are, heading quickly to the end of the year. But first, we need to slow down enough this month to enjoy Thanksgiving.

The New England colonists were accustomed to regularly celebrating "thanksgivings," or days of prayer thanking God for blessings such as a military victory or the end of a drought. The event that Americans commonly call the "First Thanksgiving" was celebrated by the Pilgrims after their first harvest in the New World in October, 1621. This feast lasted three days, and was attended by 90 Native Americans from the Wampanoag Tribe and 53 Pilgrims. [Source: Wikipedia]

Thanksgiving has been celebrated nationally on and off since 1789, with a proclamation by President George Washington after a request by Congress. The date varied through the years, until 1942, when Thanksgiving earned a permanent date by an act of Congress. Beginning then, Thanksgiving is always observed on the Fourth Thursday of November.

But shouldn't every day be a day of thanksgiving? I Chronicles 16:34 is one of the most beautiful verses in all of Scripture. It says, "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his love endures forever." This precious teaching runs

throughout the Bible. Sometimes it's repeated word for word - as in I and 2 Chronicles, Psalms, and Jeremiah. At other times, its meaning is clearly present - and that is the case in every Bible

The Bible is filled with commands to give thanks to God. Many passages give reasons why we should thank Him, such as "His love endures forever" (Psalm 136:3), "He is good" (Psalm 118:29), and "His mercy is everlasting" (Psalm 100:5). Thanksgiving and praise always go together. We cannot adequately praise and worship God without also being thankful.

Feeling and expressing appreciation is good for us. Like any wise father, God wants us to learn to be thankful for all the gifts He has given us. We should


remember that everything we have is a gift from Him. Without gratitude, we become arrogant and self-centered. We begin to believe that we have achieved everything on our own. But "Thankfulness" keeps our hearts in right relationship to God, the Giver of all good gifts.

Giving thanks also reminds us of how much we do have. As human beings, we tend to focus on what we don't have. By giving thanks continually, we are reminded of how much we do have. When we focus on blessings rather than wants, we are happier. When we start thanking God for the things we usually take for granted, our perspective changes. We realize that we could not even exist without the merciful blessings of

I Thessalonians 5:18 says, "In everything give thanks; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." We are to be thankful not only for the things we like, but for the circumstances we don't like. When we purpose to thank God for everything that He allows to come into our lives, we keep bitterness at bay. We cannot be both thankful and bitter at the same time. We do not thank Him for evil, but that He is sustaining us through it. We don't thank Him for harm He did not cause, but we thank Him when He gives us the strength to endure it.
